Meanwhile, a storm of upsets took place around the nation, once again. Kirby Smart has maintained over and over that winning on the road in the SEC is always hard, even as

those in the stands and press box and on the couch holler back that it ought to be easy for teams with the best players. The NFL's mantra for many years was that "On any given Sunday, any team can beat any other team." Saturday, too. We should never take wins for granted. Even when the scoreboard says differently, teams show up to win, and somebody's got to lose.

Georgia took down a competitive visitor on Saturday. The win wasn't especially stylish or sexy, but it was a hard-earned victory over an opponent that was desperate to win.

A lot of the postgame interviews pointed to Trevor Etienne as the key player on offense, and he sure played a major role in the win. I'll confess that I wasn't convinced before the season that he'd be The Man. Often, a player coasts on a family name. I've seen backup QB Arch Manning, who's played alright filling in for Quinn Ewers, on Heisman watch lists. C'mon, man.

I'm happy to say that I underestimated Etienne, who has turned out to be our most effective RB. Nate Frazier, who has impressed with the ball in his hands, needs to improve on pass protection to get more snaps; and Branson Robinson either plays behind poor blocking or is still returning to form, or both. It's quite a benefit for them, and those waiting their turn, to see a guy ahead of them doing things they need to improve on to earn the coaches' trust.

According to Coach Smart, on defense "You gotta do sometimes what you call 'open a can of whoop-ass' and we didn't do that." I'm like most observers, thinking that the defense doesn't seem quite as dominant as those of the last 3 years. The stats bear that out to a degree. I sometimes wonder if I'm idealizing the past, with my memory selectively recalling the crushing performances of the Davis-Carter-et al. teams. Then sometimes I wonder if those guys were just special, and likely not to be matched. But then, I look at the scoreboard and the other team is in single digits, so maybe the current group is pretty good after all. The standard for our defense is incredibly high, and that's a big reason that we usually win games.

Several media sources on Sunday morning referred to the game as a "grind." And maybe it was. But grinding is part of the team's vocabulary, and they do it well. I'll take a grinding win any day. If that's the character of this team, then let's ride it and see how far we go.

The Athens Area Diaper Bank

Diapers cost over \$1,000 every year, a cost that nearly 1 in 2 families struggle with in our country. Government assistance programs, like food stamps, Medicaid, and WIC, do NOT cover diapers. There are over 8,000 children at risk of diaper need in the Athens, GA community.

WHAT IS THE FALL-OUT OF DIAPER NEED?

PHYSICAL: When families struggle to afford diapers, they report re-using soiled diapers or keeping a baby in a dirty diaper too long. This can lead to persistent diaper rash, UTIs, and staph infections, as well as the associated medical costs.

GENERAL WELL-BEING: When families struggle to afford diapers, they must decide between buying diapers or other basic needs like food and rent.

FOOD INSECURITY: 28% of parents who report experiencing diaper need say that they skip their own meals in order to afford diapers.

MENTAL: 70% of parents who report experiencing diaper need say they feel stressed or anxious about their responsibilities as a parent. 53% say they feel judged negatively because they could not afford diapers.

EMOTIONAL: Diaper need is correlated with maternal stress and mental health need. SOCIAL: Without clean diapers, babies are not able to participate in early childhood education and social opportunities.

ECONOMIC: Without a supply of clean diapers, families can't send their babies to daycare. Without daycare, families can't go to work or school. By the numbers: 25% of parents experiencing diaper need have missed an average of 5.1 days of work each month because they didn't have enough diapers.

THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

The UGA football program has established an award honoring the courageous life and career of **David Jacobs**. An NFL-bound defensive lineman from Atlanta's impoverished Boat Rock community, David had his life take a sharp turn when he suffered a stroke after practice on Nov. 14, 2001, the first year of Mark Richt's tenure. His stroke included a vertebral artery occlusion caused by a blow to the head that made his neck whip violently, damaging the lining in the vertebral artery, leading to the development of a clot that stopped the flow of blood to his brain. The doctors at St. Mary's Hospital who examined him told his family that if his condition worsened, he'd be dead within a day; and that even the surgery only had a 2-3% chance of keeping him alive. Yet he survived, no doubt aided by a steady parade of teammates and coaches to the hospital to comfort and support him. If David worked hard to reach an elite level as a player, he had to double those efforts to recover from his stroke. How many NFL prospects have to spend time arduously re-learning how to simply walk? As reported at the time, Richt views David's journey to a successful adulthood as one of the most impactful stories from time at UGA. David's athletic competitiveness aided his recovery, allowing him to advance through therapy much faster than most, getting him out of his wheelchair within a month of his stroke. In his honor, Coach Richt established the David Jacobs Award for the Georgia football player who "shows courage to overcome adversity and finish the drill." And David was the first recipient of the award recognizing his fortitude. His recovery included speech therapy that left him better than before, when he had lived with a significant speech impediment. David is now a family man, married to his college sweetheart and the father of two sons, one of whom was offered a UGA scholarship as a HS freshman of considerable promise for the class of 2027. David is an account manager with Southeast Mortgage Corporation, where he is beloved and admired for his character and work performance. They just don't come any better than David Jacobs.

THE FORECAST DAWGS VS. MISSISSIPPI STATE

NATIONAL GAME OF THE WEEK: OREGON OVER OHIO STATE

In a week with a lot of top 20 matchups, this one is the prize. It's unusual for me not to go with the Oklahoma-Texas game. But this game features two top-ten teams who are likely headed for the playoff, which I don't think is OU's destination, given their unstable QB situation. So this matchup gets the call for my national game pick. Ohio State has reportedly put together a "natty or bust" roster, and they do have a lot of NFL prospects....as does Oregon. Ohio State really hasn't been challenged yet, but also has played a flimsy schedule, so is a hard team to evaluate; beating patsies doesn't tell you much about how a team will play when the competition gets better. (See Mississippi's cupcake, home-cooking schedule prior to their loss to Kentucky.) I think that Oregon has the edge at QB, and that can make a difference, even as I am skeptical of Gabriel's qualifications for Heisman consideration given how short a passing game he operates. But, I think they come out of this a winner as Ryan Day once again comes up a little short. Oregon 35, Ohio State 34.
