Before the game, I was pretty confident about how it'd play out. Mississippi State has had trouble stopping the run game, and we've had trouble getting our run game off the ground. So I figured that on Saturday, we'd do a lot of rock-pounding to get in rhythm. Meanwhile, MSU was starting a raw freshman QB who was more dangerous on the ground than in the air, so I figured we'd pack the box and contain them at the line of scrimmage.

Just how it turned out, right?

It was a strange sort of day at the stadium. The Dawgs scored 41 points on a ton of yardage, but also seemed to stall out for this reason or that. Every time we built a commanding lead, we lost it soon thereafter. Mississippi State was bound and determined to make a game of it, and they did in ways that raised some concerns heading into the Texas game.

We were inadequate stopping their passing game, which may have followed from a lack of pressure, coupled with coverage errors. That's not a good sign as we head to showdown against a team that believes it has two first-round NFL picks at QB. Coach Smart noted that several of his top DLs weren't in uniform on Saturday, but then, a great part of the program's recent success has come from depth, not only for fourth quarter dominance but to cover for injuries. We did pull away with a Richt-like time-eating drive in the fourth quarter, and that was satisfying. But as everyone in the stadium and in front of the tube, including the players, can tell you, the team hasn't put

together complete games this season. Great halves, for sure. But that will only get you so far in this league.

The post-game radio show, always a feature of the drive home, spoke to all of these issues, which were then aired out in the media coverage Sunday morning. Among the issues: The team has yet to establish a clear identity. On the one hand, they have often played good situational football, doing what's needed to compete against different opponents. That shows versatility. But too much versatility can lead to a mixed identity. I'm guessing that the coaches are going to work on this issue in practice this week, along with pressuring the QB and preventing the deep throw, which Texas will be much better at than MSU was, even as MSU really scalded our defensive backfield at times.

Yes, it was an odd day at the stadium. The fans took up Coach Smart's challenge to be more of a noise factor than they were vs. Auburn, but then, many fans hit the exits way too early in a game that MSU kept making competitive. I'm not sure where they were going that was better than finishing out the game, but it must have been really important. The team played down-hill on offense in terms of points and yardage, and rarely needed to punt, but it wasn't always convincing. The defense's early dominance—MSU barely moved the ball for much of the first half—was coupled with some catastrophic lapses that led to scores.

But, a win's a win, and an SEC win is an SEC win, and halfway through the season the team's at 5-1 and heading to Austin for a game of great national significance. I'm hoping for a great week of practice and four quarters of great play against a worthy opponent. This is what the season is all about.

THE COVETED DAWGMEISTER GOOD GUY OF THE WEEK AWARD GOOD GUY ARCHIVE

We all know of **Jalon Walker**, the Salisbury, NC linebacker who has made invaluable contributions on the field at both inside and outside linebacker. He was a superstar in high school, rated by the 247 composite as a 4-star prospect, the #3 linebacker nationally, the #2 prospect in North Carolina, and the #44 prospect nationally. He was named the 2020 North Carolina Gatorade Football Player of the Year, the star of an 11-1 team on both offense and as a tight end on offense. Jalon was a finalist for 2021 High School Butkus Award and was named the Central Carolina Conference Defensive Player of the Year in both his junior and senior seasons, while also being honored with the Big 22 Player of the Year for best player in Charlotte area. He also competed on the school's basketball and track teams, holding, at 6'-2", the school record for blocked shots in a game (7). He was an instant rotation player at UGA and has always been productive. He's not just an exceptional linebacker, however. Jalon has served as the Georgia football representative on the Southeastern Conference Football Leadership Council, which has met with rules officials and medical advisors to improve the quality of the games in the SEC. This respect for his leadership qualities has come along with his strong academics, through which he received a Michael A. Kahn Family Football Scholarship. The son of a Division 2 coach, Jalon knows the game from a coach's perspective, saying, "I feel like being coachable is a great aspect to have. Being coachable and always following the gameplan is a good way to go." He's also, at his insistence, just another UGA student: "I've developed a relationship with a lot of the student population here, and I feel like I have a very positive relationship with a lot of regular student friends. They always sit there and are like, 'What do you have planned today?' [Laughs] Oh, I have practice, I have meetings, then more meetings and things of that sort." When we watch guys on the field, we often forget how much study they had to do to know what to do, and Jalon is a grinder in the film room. And he's the sharpest dresser on the team, by all accounts. Stay sharp, young man. You've got a lot of greatness ahead of you.
